

From 1 July 2026



Businesses must separate food waste

Businesses generating around 4000 litres of waste a week, equivalent to 2 skip bins or more, must separate food waste from general waste to reduce landfill and emissions.

Why are there new rules?

Food waste makes up a quarter of all NSW business waste going to landfill. Increasing food waste recycling is essential to avoid a looming waste crisis and moves us closer to a circular economy.

When do the new rules start?

The new rules will happen in stages based on weekly rubbish bin volumes:

From July 1 2026 rules apply to sites with a weekly general waste capacity of around 4,000L or more.

From 1 July 2028 rules apply to sites with a weekly general waste capacity of around 2,000L or more.

From July 2030 rules apply to sites with a weekly general waste capacity of around 700L or more.

What are the penalties for non-compliance?

Councils and businesses can face maximum penalties of up to \$500,000 with further fines for continuing offences. However, the initial focus is on education and support. Councils are the regulatory authority for businesses within their LGAs, while the EPA is the regulatory authority for institutions and council-run businesses.

The EPA may consider granting exemptions in certain circumstances. These are designed to support a transition period.
