

It's time to **phase out** banned plastic items

In 2022, NSW banned certain single-use plastics including:

- Single-use plastic straws, stirrers and cutlery
- Single-use plastic plates and bowls without lids
- Expanded polystyrene food ware

End of transition period

Businesses were given a two-year transition period to phase out banned plastic items that are sealed in or that are attached to food or drinks by a machine-automated process (known as 'integrated packaging').

On 1 January 2025, the two-year transition period will end.

What do I need to do?

You need to plan how you'll stop supplying banned plastic items that have been sealed in or attached to food or drink packaging by a machine-automated process.

- **♂** Organise stocktakes of affected products
- Speak to your supplier about alternatives to these products
- ✓ Use up your stock of affected products before 1 January 2025

Good to know

- Products that include banned plastic items manually (by hand) sealed in or attached to food or drinks are already banned and cannot be supplied.
- Items made from biodegradable plastic, compostable plastic (including Australian certified compostable plastics) and bioplastics are also banned.



Supplying these products from 1 January 2025 is an offence, and you could be fined. Fines start at \$1,100 for individuals and \$5,500 for corporations.
